Literacy

During Literacy, the children will look at a range of texts.

Our main texts throughout the term are Voices In the Park and Beowulf. Within Voices In The Park, children will be able to investigate the meaning behind the detailed illustrations. Children will also have the opportunity to write their own poem, a biography and an author review based on these texts.

Numeracy

This term children will continue to consolidate their understanding of the four operations, with a particular focus on subtraction and division. They will also be explore angle, including how to measure, compare and identify a given angle. Following this, students will then be exploring fractions and how to compare, order and add fractions. Finally, students will be exploring different units of measure and how we can convert between them.

Humanities

In Geography, we will be exploring the continent of South America. We will be investigating the geographical features of the continent and will continue to develop our geography skills in map reading and data analysis.

In History, we will learn about the Anglo Saxons and will be using timelines to uncover which period of time they were present in Britain. We will discover where they invaded and settled and explore links between the history of Wolverhampton and the Anglo-Saxons.

Science

In science this term, year 5 will plan and conduct investigations in to the properties of materials.

We will explore what makes certain materials waterproof or soundproof, as well as investigating thermal and electrical conductors and insulators. We will be presenting our findings in a variety of ways, including line graphs and reports.

Within Spring I, year 5 will be exploring art within maths. We will explore the use of geometric pattern in ancient art work and the children will create their own bright, eye-catching geometric art.



P.S.H.E

In P.S.H.E, children will begin to look at dreams and goals. They will discuss what keeps them motivated and also what they can do to achieve their personal goals. Additionally, children will identify how we can work together with different cultures to learn things and support one another in being successful.

Children will need to wear their P.E kit to school on a Friday and attend with their full swimming kit. Over this term, the children will be continuing to develop their swimming skills.

In Computing, we will be learning how to use spreadsheets to input and organise data. In particular we will be learning the importance of data collection and how software like spreadsheet can help us to easily organise and analyse information.






