Year 6: Spring Term

Literacy

The text, Viking Boy, presents many opportunities for the children to produce shorter and extended pieces of writing. We will complete setting and character descriptions, and a 'show-not-tell' narrative based on building suspense. Our extended writing will be a newspaper article on the Viking battle.

In Reading, the children will continue to consolidate their skills of retrieval, inference and explaining the meaning of words in context, through weekly comprehension lessons. We will hone in on the skill of providing reasoned justifications for views and answers. We will continue to ensure that children are fluent readers with a deep understanding of what they have read.

Spring Term 2 is a particularly important half term in Year 6, in that it is our final full half term before our SATs tests after the Easter holiday. Using a series of shorter Literacy units, we will address any gaps that we may have in our reading and writing and SPaG skills, to really show off our academic journey since starting at Trinity. We will complete a number of writing tasks to show that we understand and can apply all objectives in the Year 6 curriculum. Using visual Literacy units such as, 'The Lighthouse', we will write a dramatic retell of events, an information text and a diary entry exploring the features needed for specific genres of writing.



We will continue to focus on the use of appropriate grammar and vocabulary to enhance meaning, and use cohesive devices within and between paragraphs. We will ensure that tenses, and subject/verb agreement are consistent throughout.

Numeracy

Spring term will focus on skills not yet covered in Year 6 such as percentages, ratio and proportion, properties of shape, including position and translation. In their weekly arithmetic session, the children will continue to cover a range of topics focusing particularly on place value and the four operations (+, -, x +). Spring 2 will focus on allowing the children to deepen their understanding of given skills through the use of SATsstyle questions.

R.E.

In Spring | pupils will be build on prior learning of the Sikhi faith. They will be consider the core beliefs of the faith and the importance of charity within the community. Pupils will have an opportunity to plan their own langar inspired project.

In Spring 2, the children will deepen their understanding of Christianity. Through discussion and activities, children will consider what the 'The Kingdom of Heaven' means to Christians and how it influences the way believers carry out their day to day lives.



Humanities Geography

Geographical Skills

In Spring | the children will focus on using their geographical skills to use the four and six-figure grid references to accurately read ordnance survey maps, learn how to use a compass and how to read the typography of the land. They will also take part in some field work exploring our surrounding area using digital technologies to highlight the physical and human features of our school and its surroundings. To complete this topic, the children will use maps to identify specific features and places and compare and contrast a rural area with our local area.

Humanities History

Crime and Punishment

In Spring 2 the children will learn about crime and punishment throughout history. Beginning with the Romans, Medieval and Tudor periods they will explore the types of crime and punishments that were given, comparing the different periods of history. Throughout this topic, they will explore what changes impacted early crime and why there was a significant rise in child criminality.

To conclude, the children will research and explain the given question How does crime and punishment differ today?' Drawing on their knowledge gained before presenting their findings.



PSHE

This term, pupils will consider their 'Goals and Aspiration.' As part of their unit, pupils will reflect on previous goals set, explore ways in which we can overcome barriers to our learning in addition to setting SMART targets. We will end the term celebrating 'Mental Health Week' we we will explore ways and techniques to

Dance and Music

previously taught developing skills in both music and dance.

Science

Our topics in Science this term are 'ELECTRICITY' and 'LIGHT'. The children will be considering how to represent simple circuits in diagram form, and then to create these circuits using different components. They will investigate the effects. of changing components in a circuit and explain their findings.

In our light topic, the children will be developing their understanding about how light travels and look at 'white light' and understand that it is made of different colours.

Homework is set every <u>Friday</u>, to be returned by the following <u>Thursday</u>. Children will receive new maths and literacy work weekly. This homework will be set on 'Google Classrooms' or 'Bug Club'.
